

Hand Washing Policy and Procedure

Policy Statement

Staff at Mark Oliphant College Children's Centre aim to protect the health, safety and wellbeing of each child at all times in relation to hand hygiene. To minimise the spread of infection educators follow the hand washing procedure outlined in 'Staying Healthy in Childcare 5th Edition'.

Supporting Evidence

Implementation

The process of thoroughly washing, rinsing, and drying your hands or a child's hands should take around 30 seconds.

- 1. Wet hands with running water (preferably warm water, for comfort).
- 2. Apply soap to hands.
- 3. Lather soap and rub hands thoroughly, including the wrists, the palms, between the fingers, around the thumbs and under the nails. Rub hands together for at least 15 seconds (for about as long as it takes to sing 'Happy Birthday' once).
- 4. Rinse thoroughly under running water.
- 5. Dry thoroughly with paper towel.

Do I really need to wear gloves?

Is there is a chance that you may come in contact with faeces, urine, saliva, vomit or blood? WEAR GLOVES If you are not likely to come in contact with faeces, urine, saliva, vomit or blood NO NEED FOR GLOVES When to Wash Hands (Staying Healthy in Childcare 5th Edition):
