Canteen

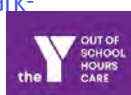

Car Parking and the Kiss & Drop Area

Traffic congestion on both Newton Boulevard and Douglas Drive at delivery and pick up times is of great concern. Parent compliance with traffic laws is essential. This includes parking on the yellow lines, particularly in the Children's Centre drop off zone. There is restricted vehicle access to the school grounds to ensure the safety of children at all times.

The College Kiss and Drop Facility is located at the front of the college in Douglas Drive to enable parents the ability to drop off and pick up students safely.

This area is a 2 minute zone and will operate 8:00am - 9:00am and 2:00pm - 4:00pm, Monday to Friday. Drivers must remain with their vehicles at all times.

Communication

The College operates an SMS messaging facility, as well as via Daymap and EdSmart. EdSmart is an email based tool for digital administration and community. The platform streamlines communication and will be used to deliver broadcast messages to parents and students along with permission slips and forms as the program is expanded within the College.

Curriculum

Mark Oliphant College follows the Australian Curriculum from Foundation to Year 10, and SACE in Year 11 and 12.

Day Structure

Early Dismissal Process

If you require to collect your child during school hours, the process is as follows:

Emergency Contact Information

Evacuation & Lockdown Procedures

A siren sounding "EVACUATE" will be heard and staff, students and visitors MUST all evacuate to designated areas. In the event of a Lockdown an alert signal will be heard and staff and students are to remain in their classroom.

Excursions Camps

These are planned in an organised way over a school year to support student learning. Notification of costs and payment will come together with details of the activity and permission forms ahead of time. All payments can be made via the Qkr! app.

Gate Closing Time

Please note that the school gates are locked at 8:50am each morning. All access gates will be locked at 9am. Anyone arriving after 8:50am are required to sign in via the front office.

Hats

All children in the Children's Centre, Early and Primary Years are required to wear a broad-brimmed hat at recess, lunch times and in outdoor lessons all year round as part of the Department's 'Sun Smart Policy'.

Children who do not have a suitable hat will have to remain in an alternate area at recess and lunch periods. F-6 recommend purchasing a hat from a retail outlet (such as Kmart) as Devon Clothing do not stock specific Mark Oliphant College Hats.

Health Care Plans

These are a critical aspect for the wellbeing of our students. Students with specific and significant medical problems must have a Health Care Plan such that the school knows of the child's medical condition and required actions can be agreed. Parents are asked to notify the school immediately of such medical issues/problems and to then provide via their GP or Specialist detailed information that will support the school in working with their child.

No medication will be administered without a Health Care Plan. All Health Care Plans need to be updated if a student is attending an excursion or camp. Children will not be able to attend without this.

Identification Cards (ID)

ID cards are issued to students in Years 7-12. Photographs of students are taken by Advancedlife Photography on Thursday 6 February 2025. For students that arrive after this date, it is arranged for them to have their photos taken in the library as soon as possible.

The cards are used in the library, on public transport and as general proof of identification for students accessing entertainment and recreational facilities at a student concession.

The initial cost of the card is covered in the Material and Services Charge.

Replacement cards will cost \$10.00. This cost must be paid BEFORE a new card can be issued.

Instrumental Music

Students from Year 7-10 have the opportunity to participate in an Instrumental Music Program. Contact the College for more information.

Materials and Services Charges

School fees are called 'materials and services charges' and have a legally enforceable component. Fees are set by Governing Council and help provide many of the extras that make Mark Oliphant College a quality school. Fee accounts are sent home at the beginning of each school year, with early payment encouraged to enable the start of year purchases to be made.

To support our community, Mark Oliphant College continues to keep our basic school fees at parity with the School Card. The fees for 2025 are: Primary (Foundation - Year 6) \$300.00, Secondary (Year 7-12) \$396.00

Materials Services Charges will be used, together with the Department for Education grants, to provide students with items like:

text books, workbooks, art & craft supplies, science materials and supplies, library resources, photocopied material, worksheets that have been copied printed and materials for chosen curriculum subjects.

Technology devices, text books and materials issued to students remain the property of the school. Payment for this can be made via the Qkr!app.

Positive Behaviour for Learning - PBL

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is an evidence-based framework designed to support the academic, social, and behavioural development of all students through a whole-school, multi-tiered approach. It helps schools create safe, positive, and inclusive learning environments by explicitly teaching and reinforcing desired behaviours.

PBL supports students and families by meeting individual developmental and community needs, promoting improved behaviour outcomes, and allowing more time for effective teaching and learning.

School Card

The 2026 School Card allowance for Primary students is \$300.00 and for Secondary students is \$396.00. This is the same as our Materials and Services charges. If you are eligible for School Card, your Materials and Services invoice will be covered in full.

All parents / caregivers / independent students wishing to be considered for School Card Assistance must apply each year to receive the School Card allowance. The Department for Education is making the application process easier.

All School Card applications are online. Please visit the Department for Education website to lodge your application. The Department for Education automatically informs the school of your application and will inform you of your eligibility.

Abstudy

Aboriginal parents of secondary students must apply for Abstudy plus School Card every year. Abstudy is applied for through Centrelink only

Services

Grow up Smiling

At the end of Terms 2 and 4 the dentists from Grow up Smiling visit our School to provide professional assessments and treatment and it is all covered under Medicare.

Swimming

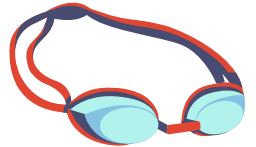
For all students F-6: Term 2 Swimming

WHAT IS SCHOOL CARD?



School Card provides financial help to cover the cost of school fees.

WHO CAN APPLY?

To qualify for School Card, your family's income must be below a specific limit. This limit depends on how many children are in your care.

You must also meet at least one of the following:

- have a child or children aged four years or over who attend a school full time
- be an independent full-time student studying year 10, 11 or 12
- be an adult re-entry student undertaking subjects to complete SACE (years 11 and 12).

APPLYING FOR A SCHOOL CARD



All types of School Card applications are now online.

You can access the online forms from any device that gets internet, including mobile devices, such as tablets and smart phones, as well as laptops and computers.

Applying online is easy! Simply follow the steps below.

- STEP 1** Visit sa.gov.au/education/schoolcard
- STEP 2** Select the type of School Card you would like to apply for (for example 'Type A') and follow the prompts.
- STEP 3** Complete all mandatory fields.
Please note, you cannot submit your application unless all mandatory fields are complete.
- STEP 4** Once you have completed a page click on the 'NEXT' button.
- STEP 5** Once you have filled out all pages click the 'SUBMIT' button.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR FOR LEARNING

WHAT IS PBL?

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is an evidence-based framework designed to support the academic, social, and behavioural development of all students through a whole-school, multitiered approach. It helps schools create safe, positive, and inclusive learning environments by explicitly teaching and reinforcing desired behaviours.

PBL supports students and families by meeting individual developmental and community needs, promoting improved behaviour outcomes, and allowing more time for effective teaching and learning.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN FOR STUDENTS?

PBL takes away the assumption that students know what is expected of them in situations and instead uses a model of teaching desired behaviours so that everyone can succeed.

Unlike traditional behaviour management systems that rely on punishment, PBL is proactive, contextualised to each school setting, and focused on fostering a respectful and supportive culture where every student can thrive.

It is important to note that this does not mean there are no consequences. Students will still receive consequences for behaviour that warrants it, however there is a larger emphasis placed on educating students around their behaviour in the aim that they will make better choices.

HOW CAN YOU SUPPORT?

Families can help support the implementation of PBL by reinforcing the same positive behaviours and expectations used in school.

This can be as simple as modelling the school values of respect, kindness, belonging and responsibility or by acknowledging and praising positive behaviours of your student.

Working alongside the school by staying up to date with the expectations, attending school events and communicating with teachers will also help students build strong habits for long lasting success.

Mark Oliphant College 2026 Laptop Program

Since inception, Mark Oliphant College has a proud tradition of providing the latest technology to all learners from Birth to Year 12. This enables students to learn the ICT capabilities required to use ICT effectively and become responsible digital citizens both at and beyond school.

In the Secondary Years of schooling all students can join the Mark Oliphant Laptop Program.

These devices are managed by the schools ICT Department but remain the property of the Mark Oliphant College.

The cost of providing and maintaining such devices for over 1,200 students in the Secondary Years is becoming increasingly difficult and is not sustainable.

For this reason the School has decided with the endorsement of Governing Council from the beginning of 2023 we are updating the way we partner with our school community so we can continue to provide a high quality device for every student.

All Year 7s and 8s will receive a Chromebook, which will require a security deposit of \$100 to be paid prior to being borrowed.

This deposit is refunded when the device is returned in the same condition in which it was borrowed at the end of the year. However, in the event the Chromebook is returned damaged/lost the \$100 deposit will be drawn on to offset the cost of the repairs.

Students from Years 9 through to Year 12 can also opt in receive a Chromebook in which a co-contribution payment of \$100 will be paid for the use of that device for the year.

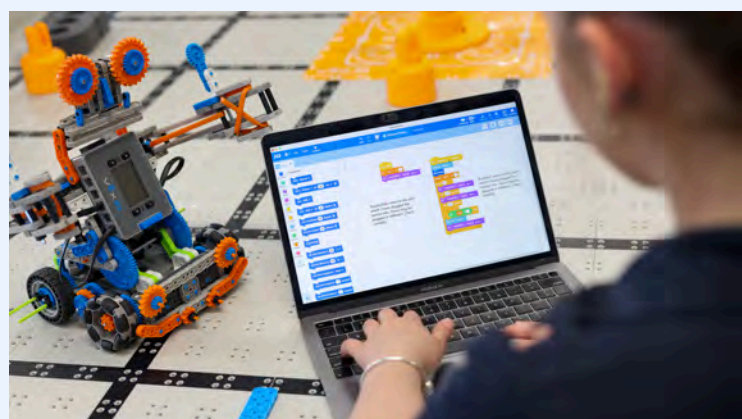
Essentially nothing will change for students in terms of how they access devices in the Secondary Years of schooling.

Mark Oliphant College Students who make four \$100 payments from Years 9 through to Year 12 will be able keep the Chromebook at the end of Year 12.

This \$400 cost represents excellent value as these devices currently cost the school in excess of \$750 each.

Students alternatively can opt into the BYOD (Bring your own device) Program.

This Program will allow suitable devices to be used at school throughout the school year with access to basic ICT Support.



Language Other Than English (LOTE) - Indonesian



Learning a different language provides the opportunity for students to engage with the linguistic and cultural diversity of the world and its peoples.

Studies have shown that speaking a foreign language improves the way in which the brain functions, by challenging it to recognise, negotiate meaning and communicate in a different way.

Learning languages has proven to improve student's communication and strengthen literacy skills in their first language. It enhances critical and creative skills and broadens student's horizons in terms of personal, social and employment opportunities.

At Mark Oliphant College, we offer students the opportunity to learn Indonesian as an additional language from Year 1 onward. Indonesia is one of our country's closest neighbours and is also a popular tourist destination for Australians.

Indonesian is the tenth most common language spoken around the world and is known as not being overly complicated to learn. Like English, it uses a Latin alphabet and unlike many European languages, it doesn't have noun genders. Lessons to Years 1-8 will be delivered by a group of dedicated Indonesian teachers, who will work with students over a full year for 100 minutes per week.

During these classes, students will learn how to read, write and speak Indonesian and will also be introduced to the customs and culture of this beautiful country.

Our Children's Centre for Early Childhood Development and Parenting is an integral part of Mark Oliphant College B-12. The Centre brings together care, education, health, community development activities and services for families with young children.

Programs

Our Preschool provides a sessional Departmental funded curriculum-based-5-year-old program which operates Monday to Friday during school terms.

Occasional Care operates 5 sessions a week on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday with programs for children over 2 and under 2 years of age running concurrently.

A range of playgroups and other family programs are offered, varying each term.

Our Curriculum:

We are guided by the principles of the National Quality Framework:

The rights of the child are paramount

- Children are successful, capable and competent learners
- We strive for equity, inclusion and diversity
- Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures are valued
- The role of parents and families is respected and supported
- The provision of high quality education and care is expected



Our play-based curriculum is developed using the National Early Years Learning Framework for Australia: Being, Belonging and Becoming. We recognise, value and advocate for children to learn through play. Through play children experiment, discover, manipulate, invent and draw conclusions. Belonging is the basis for living a fulfilling life, Children feel they belong because of the relationship they have with their family, community, culture and place.

Being is about living here and now. Childhood is a special time in life and children need time to just 'be', time to play, try new things and have fun.

Becoming is about the learning and development that young children experience. Children start to form their sense of identity from an early age, which shapes the type of adult they will become.

Learning Outcomes

Our key learning outcomes are aligned to the National Early Years Learning Framework and encompass the following key understandings:

- Children have a strong sense of wellbeing
- Children are confident and involved learners
- Children are effective communicators
- Children have a strong sense of identity
- Children are connected with and contribute to their world

Educators use the Early Years Learning Framework to create learning programs which build on the interests and abilities of your child. They engage in shared sustained conversations with children to extend thinking and take on a variety of roles during play.

Educators use the framework to observe your child's learning and then carefully plan activities and create stimulating indoor and outdoor learning environments in order to foster learning and development.

Educators' observations, along with the experiences provided for your child will be documented through photos, work samples and learning stories.



Our Bush/Beach Kindy program was developed in response to research that shows outdoor activities in a natural environment are extremely beneficial to children's health, wellbeing and development. Originating in Scandinavia in the 1950s, the forest preschool approach has been used as a framework for Bush Kindy in Australia, where children are encouraged to play in, and learn from, our natural environment

Key features of our Bush/Beach Kindy approach include:

- Children spend long and regular periods of time in unstructured or semi structured play in natural environments all year around
- Children experience the daily and seasonal fluctuations in weather and seasons
- Educators play a key role in promoting children as researchers, nurturing their inquiries and engaging in shared sustained conversations
- Children develop their knowledge of Aboriginal Culture Current research on children who regularly play in outdoor natural settings has concluded that they have:
 - Increased confidence, motivation, concentration and resilience
 - Increased social, physical and language skills
 - Deeper conceptual understanding and respect for the natural environment
 - Mud, sand, water, leaves, sticks etc. can stimulate children's immune systems, resulting in less illness
 - Children are more physically active and more likely to be a healthy weight
 - Children are more resistant to stress, have lower incidence of behavioural disorders, anxiety and depression, and have a higher measure of self-worth
 - Deepened children's understanding of community and offers better opportunities for children to be present and authentically engaged in real life
 - Encourages a well-connected, cohesive community that is environmentally aware

Services

Community Development Coordinator

The Community Development Coordinator works to increase community capacity to support families to provide the best opportunities for every child. The Community Development Coordinator works with families and focuses on increasing their parenting capacity, linking them with a range of services and encouraging their participation within their community and in the directions of the Centre.

The Community Development Coordinator also promotes partnerships across a broad range of local service and organisations and establishes interagency programs to meet the needs of the community. Each term there is a Children's Centre Community Program that is wide ranging. The program is published in newsletters, on Facebook and via the Children's Centre.

Playgroups and Parenting Programs

We offer a number of playgroups and a variety of parenting programs all year round. Our playgroups support your child's development through sharing songs, rhymes, oral language, painting, drawing, writing and sharing books.

There are many benefits to attending a playgroup with your child including:

- Focus on respectful relationships, wellbeing and learning
- Supporting positive interactions between parents or carers and their children
- Working individually with families through modelling, providing an environment and resources for interactions and providing a framework for parents and carers to observe their children's learning
- Support families to be their child's first teacher by supporting early literacy, numeracy, development and engagement with learning through play and interactions Improve early learning opportunities for children Support the development and wellbeing of children and their parents
- Empower parents and increase parent capacity to support their children's learning and development
- Provide access to quality information and resources
- Strengthen communities through interagency collaboration and coordination in the provision of family focused programs and services
- For families to connect with their local community, and for carers and children to connect with each other through play
- Promote and support positive relationships between families and early childhood services and schools, including transitions from home to early childhood settings and schools.

Allied Health Program

The allied health program supports early intervention for children aged birth to 3 years to minimise developmental delays. The program builds the capacity of children's centre preschool staff to identify children at risk of developmental delay, and supports staff and parents in promoting child development.

Allied health staff are:

- speech pathologists, who assist with all aspects of communication including speech, language, literacy, signs, symbols and gestures and can also assist with issues around eating and drinking
- occupational therapists, who support children's participation in and performance of daily activities involving the strengthening of play skills, fine and gross motor skills, concentration and self-regulation skills.

Allied health staff build the capacity of parents and carers of the centre through:

- parenting groups, parent consultation, referrals and distribution of resources to assist children with toileting, feeding, play, speech and language skills.

Preschool Charges

- Preschool invoices will be issued at the beginning of the year and are required to be paid in full by the end of your child's second term
- Preschool is \$400.00 for the year
- Occasional Care invoices will be issued at the beginning of each term and need to be paid in full
- The School Card scheme is not offered to preschool children
- Occasional Care invoices will be issued at the beginning of each term and need to be paid in full
- \$5.00 or \$1.50 concession card holders per session
- Bush and Beach Kindy Programs are an additional cost
